Focus / Activity

Green Drinks Liverpool 6th April, Dr Duncan's – Part of the Green Drinks International Network

Our 2017 programme of activity kicked off with our monthly Green Drinks gathering and continued on the first Thursday of the month for the whole year.

Natural Health Service - The Next Steps 9th May 2017

We supported the Mersey Forest with their national Natural Health Service event held at Liverpool John Moores University with 147 delegates in attendance. This event had an array of speakers from academia, foundations and the NHS.

3rd Annual Gary Mahoney Memorial Debate - Britannia Adelphi Hotel, Thursday, 1st June

MET and Liverpool Friends of the Earth presented the annual Gary Mahoney Memorial Debate at The Pearce Suite in The Adelphi Hotel. This was the third annual debate held in honour of Gary Mahoney, Air Quality Manager with Sefton Council and long-time Friends of the Earth representative, whose sudden death in November 2014 was a sad loss for environmentalists on Merseyside and beyond. The title of this year's debate was 'How Green Can We Go?' - Most thinking people are clear that we humans have to tackle climate change and pollution, cut out waste, protect wildlife and allow ourselves green spaces to breathe in, if present and future generations are to live healthily on this planet. The debate asked "So how can we become cleaner and greener locally? What should we expect from our about-to-be-elected national government, our recently-elected 'City Region' Mayor, of corporations and local businesses, of trade unions, faith and community groups, our neighbours...and ourselves"? Chaired and hosted by Annie Merry of Faiths4Change, Clara Paillard, Liverpool-based member of the PCS union's national executive committee and active with Trade Unions for Energy Democracy, and David Connor, Managing of Coethica Ltd and regional promoter of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals opened a discussion on ways of making sure that green words can become green action.

Natural Health Service 25th September at the Sherrington Building University of Liverpool.

Our 3rd Health and the Environment event in partnership with the Duncan Society with guest speaker Clare Olver, Mersey Forest. The Natural Health Service uses the natural environment to improve the health and wellbeing of individuals, families and communities across Merseyside and North Cheshire. We see the natural environment – our parks, woodlands and other green spaces - as a health asset; places that can contribute to the prevention and treatment of physical and mental health conditions. They are working with Liverpool John Moores University and the University of Liverpool to create a long-term research programme, a Centre of Excellence for Natural Health Service Research. This is already producing ground-breaking work that is helping to improve delivery of the Natural Health Service. The talk explored the results of the work, and progress that has been made over in bringing together a consortium of organisations with the aim of the Natural Health Service being commissioned as part of a holistic approach to health care and improvement.

World Faiths, Climate Change and Community Influence, 14th November at the Mersey Maritime, Maritime Knowledge Hub, Birkenhead.

We sponsored, supported and facilitated a climate change community engagement event organised by Faiths4 Change in partnership with Wirral MBC, Energy Projects Plus, Merseyside Council of Faiths and Merseyside Women in Faith Group (WING). Over 30 delegates attended and participated in 3 workshops on:

- Energy
 Waste, Water & Carbon Footprint
- 3. Community Influence and Activism

With opening remarks from Professor Peter Scott, University of Manchester (Samuel Ferguson Professor of Applied Theology & Director of the Lincoln Theological Institute).

Introduction to the SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals) for the Public and Social Sectors 14th November 2030hub, Argyle Street, Liverpool.

In partnership with the Liverpool 2030hub we sponsored the above event a two hour introduction to the UN Sustainable Development Goals for the Public and Social Sectors to find out more about the Global Goals, and how the Liverpool City Region can become a beacon for best practice and collaboration.

The session explored:

- 1) What are the UN Sustainable Development Goals / Global Goals?
- 2) What do these look like in a Liverpool City Region context?
- 3) Why cities are the next big thing on the UN radar
- 4) What extra resources are available via the 2030hub and the United Nations through
- 5) Who are the local SDG early adopters and historic leaders
- 6) How to stimulate and create additional private sector collaboration

Other Activity Metropolitan Mayor Elections

People's Vision - Working with Liverpool Friends of the Earth and Transition we engaged in the developing the Peoples Vision Survey to generate a number of questions to pose to the Metropolitan Mayoral Candidates. The survey was publicised via the MET website and social media. A MET volunteer Emma Smith then collated all the free text replies to group them and create appropriate questions.

Clean Air Act Campaign – MET with the partners above jointly signed a Letter to all Metro Mayor Candidates about air quality.

Interviews with Students for Projects

We have also hosted a number of interviews from students from both the University of Liverpool and Liverpool John Moores as well as interviews with students from Berlin!

Finance and Other Support for the Trust

The Trust still receives modest membership fees and still maintains a moderately healthy bank balance, but we cannot continue as we are for many more years as our accounts will attest. A priority for the Trust going forward will be to develop a more strategic fundraising strategy.

Again we have to thank the University of Liverpool for their continuing support in providing office space for the Trust which is a very valuable asset to us.
